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
Telling the Mother Lange Story - One Rosary at a Time

It is well known that much of Mother Lange's spirituality is centered around her relationship with Mary, the Mother of God. Taking the name of God's mother Mary as she entered religious life came, out of her devotion and recognition that to honor Mary was to honor God. Given the perils of her journey to holiness, Mother Mary, as do her daughters today, find much solace in regularly praying the rosary. Mother Lange and her daughters know that praying the rosary is a sure way to the heart of Christ. And that through Mary they would receive graces that would hasten fulfillment.

Mother Lange Day—A Good Beginning for Black History Month

The annual service celebrating Mother Lange's death was held February 3rd at Mount Providence Convent. One of the highlights of the program was the testimonial of two individuals cured of illnesses that their doctors had indicated was terminal. Both prayed for healing through the intercession of Mother Lange. Both have survived five or more years and hope that by sharing their story, others will take intercessory prayer seriously, have increased hope and trust that God will also favor their requests. Medical records of the healings await the scrutiny of proper authorities.

Dr. Diana Hayes, guest speaker for the occasion, kept her hearers spellbound by her presentation of Lange's life. She made even well known facts come alive as she clothed them in the historical setting reflecting Dr. Hayes' rich background of study and experience. She followed the Oblate Foundress from Fells Point, the place of ship disembarkation, through the city of Baltimore to Chase Street where Mother last lived and died. She recounted the saintly life lived in spite of the suffering and indignities heaped upon her. She also had a sense of joy through the peace and confidence that was hers in the knowledge that she was doing God's will. What a fitting celebration of her going home!

Mother Lange, Pioneering Black Catholic Educator

(Excerpts from an article by Frere Buteau Espiegle, Publice Relations Officer of the Brooklyn, New York Mother Lange Guild Chapter).

"To understand the courage and daring of Mother Lange, it is necessary... to comprehend the depths of white

resistance to the education of black children in 19th century America. One strong evidence of that was a letter from Harriet Thompson, a black woman from New York to Pope Pius IX, in 1853. In her letter to the pope, she pointed out that their children were refused admission to the Catholic schools because of their race.

"Let the little ones come to me and forbid them not, for of such is the kingdom of heaven" (Mt. 19:14). Oblates with a few of their charges:

Lange demonstrated that she was a woman of extraordinary strength and character when she... founded the first black Catholic school in Baltimore and the first [lasting] religious congregation of women of color in the world, the Oblate Sisters of Providence.

The school that began in Lange's house... [1828] still exists—St. Frances Academy. It continues today to provide quality education. It is the oldest [continuing educational] facility for children of color in the United States. Their mission was to secure the permanency of a

black Catholic school in the slave holding state of Maryland.

Msgr. Guy Sansaricq, Director of the National Center [of the Haitian Apostolate] said that Mother Lange's legacy to the black community deserves the highest recognition. Her prodigious dedication to the

education of black children sprang from her deep faith and her tremendous devotion to the Holy Eucharist... Hence, the opposition constantly directed against her never generated any form of bitterness but rather fueled her ardor to the cause she so strongly believed. It is evident that Mother Mary Lange revolutionized Catholic Education. The suffering, humiliations and perseverance

of Mother Mary Lange and the nineteenth century Oblates have contributed to the flowering in the twenty-first century of ... black bishops and ... black ... theologians... Sister Mary Virginie Fish, Director of the Mother Lange Guild for the Canonization of Mother Mary Lange said: "The Mother Mary Lange story is a story of courage and wisdom, a chronicle unique in the annals of Catholic and secular history... Mother Lange continues to speak to the world in several ways: as an immigrant, as an African American and as a Catholic.


"The principal purpose and aim of Mother Lange Chapters shall be to work alongside the Mother Lange Guild Board for the canonization of Mother Mary Lange, the foundress of the Oblate Sisters of Providence.

Chapters reach people not accessible to members of the Guild. They adopt the daily philosophy of Mother Lange: "Our sole wish is to do the will of God." Chapter members tell the Mother Lange story, know and share her spiritual gifts, encourage the development of providence spirituality: trust in God,

experience deep devotion to the Eucharist and to the Mother of God (especially through the rosary). Members pray for her

canonization. Chapters give service especially to the poor and marginalized, and assist the Guild through membership and an annual monetary offering to further the work of research, education, and promotional activities.

When a Healing is Reported

A brief outline of the preliminary steps to be followed when notified of a possible cure:

- 1. A preliminary questionnaire is sent to the person reporting the cure (petitioner).
- The questionnaire is reviewed by the Postulator. If the cure appears viable, the petitioner is requested to forward all medical records (any costs are borne by the canonization cause).
- 3. Once these documents are received, the cause will enlist the services of a medical doctor whose specialty is in the field of the alleged cure. This doctor will review all records and testimony and submit his independent opinion as to whether or not there exists a natural explanation for the cure.
- If the doctor can find no medical explanation, the material is forwarded to Rome for review by the Postulator-General and another medical expert.
- 5. With the approval of the Postulator-General, the formal investigatory phase of the process would then begin at the local Tribunal, where the petitioner, witnesses and doctors will be interviewed.

Rest Without Arrest

This is a testimonial of power: the power of intercessory prayer; the power through perseverance; and the power of trust and faith. The writer has long been a devotee of Servant of God Mary Lange.

In my early years as a State Parole Agent one of my parolees relapsed into drug use and ran off. I got the required warrant. Later he telephoned and asked if he could straighten things out. My only permitted answer was, "Turn your self in to the police." He didn't do that and he was found a few months later floating dead in a molasses tanker car.

The next time I got such a phone call I told the client to enter a free drug rehab like the Salvation Army and call me from there. Once inpatient status was confirmed I wrote to the judge and asked that my warrant be changed to a summons-just a letter in the mail. In 100 such requests in subsequent years no judge ever refused me.

I ask Mother Lange daily to help me institutionalize this procedure. On November 21, 2005 my article explaining Rest Without Arrest was published in the *Baltimore Sun*. Since then the president of a large grant foundation has offered financial assistance. If my program emerges in Baltimore it is only because Mother Lange interceded in heaven for me.
