Archdiocesan Investigation of Documents accepted and validated

The following is a summary and update on the status of documents sent to Rome.

The documentation representing the Diocesan investigation was submitted and the Cause for Mother Lange was officially opened. The Copia Pubblica was prepared by the clerk of the Congregation [of the Saints] based on the submitted documentation. The documentation miracle or miracles we have be sent to him. was accepted and the decree of validity of the Diocesan investigation was given.

The request to appoint the relatore (the Congregation for the Causes of Saints clerk serving as a director while the Positio on the life and heroic virtues is being written) has been approved. A Monsignor Guttierez will serve as our relatore. Father Spiewak met with him and they decided the Positio will be prepared and presented in English.

Soon after I met an Oblate Sister, so I was led to pray for Mother Lange's aid. At my next visit to Immigration Court, after 4 years of seeking asylum, it was granted to me only 20 minutes later! I continue to ask for full recovery.

Haitian Writing Contest An On-Line Interview with Father Parick Aris

Father Patrick Aris is the director of the Office for Haitian Affairs in Washington, DC. The interviewer is Sister Virginie Fish, director of the M. L. Guild for the canonization of Mother Mary Lange.

The Mother Mary Lange Guild enjoys a supportive satellite group known as the HAU Chapter (Haitian Americans United for Mother Lange). Members gather from Washington, Baltimore and Virginia in solidarity of their Haitian heritage and give of their time, skills and means to support the cause for canonization of Mother Mary Lange.

This summer the general Haitian community, under the direction of Father Aris held their Fifth Annual Writing Contest. Sister Virginie "caught up" with Father to get more information.

SisterVirgine: Father, what is the purpose of the Writing Contest?

Father Aris: The Haitian Writing Contest is an independent educational activity sponsored by the Mission Notre Dame du Perpetuel Secours

(MNDPS). It was established for the first time by Father Andre Pierre to help the young of our community have a strong knowledge about Mother Lange and to keep them busy during vacation time.

SisterVirgine: Are other educational activities offered?

Father Aris: The Haitian community sponsors a summer academic program for youth. Our goals are to continue to improve the knowledge of the young about Mother Lange; other experiences offered are to visit a black museum, choose a role model among black celebrities and heroes, and write a prayer asking, through Mother Lange's intercession, the end of world hunger, help for orphans, war victims, soldiers, Haiti, etc.

SisterVirgine: Why is this activity so important?

Father Aris: It is important that Haitian youth maintain the literacy and culture of their heritage. It is an open door to the whole Haitian community and a way to promote the Cause of Mother Lange.



Mother Lange Joins Pierre Toussaint

The "Pierre Toussaint Information Center" has changed its name to "Pierre Toussaint and Mother Mary Lange Information Center."

The main purpose of the Center [is to] better make known the life and achievements of these two flowers of Haiti who blossomed in the U. S. A. In this respect, we are only supporting the works of the Pierre Toussaint Guild and the Mother Lange Guild of whom we are members. We distribute free prayer cards, brochures etc. We encourage people to become members of the Guilds and organize prayer meetings from time to time. We presently have some mini projects in planning such as a free course on writing and reading the Creole, and another for adults who wish to learn computer but have no time or possibility to go to school.

We do not ask for dues and we do not collect funds (except upon formal request by one of the guilds). Our services are free. But we encourage people to make donations directly to the Guilds.

Last Rites for Mother Mary: Administered by the "Second Founder"

When Father Joubert died in November, 1843, no other priest was willing or able to take over the task as Director of the Oblate community. For nearly four years the Sisters were left on their own. Then Providence inspired the Superior of the Redemptorist community, Father John N. Neumann, CSsR (now a canonized Saint) to recommend


the task to newly ordained Father Thaddeus Anwander, CSsR. The young priest was able to get a reluctant permission from Archbishop Eccleston. ("Cui Bono," he had said, "To what purpose?")

For more than seven years the new Director worked to attract vocations, strengthen the program at St. Frances

Academy, beg money and become truly a "second founder". Even after his transfer to New Orleans in 1855 and through further assignments he visited the convent and Mother Lange.

So it was that during a visit he had just said an early Mass for the Sisters on February 3, 1882 when he was called to assist Mother Lange on her deathbed. Father Anwander did so much for the Oblates he is lovingly considered "the second founder". He died November 1, 1893. He is buried in a cemetery in the comunity of
