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Homegoing - 125 Years Ago

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It was cold and dark outside, but inside held warmth, light, a spirit of kinship and gladness. The 125th anniversary of Mother Mary Lange's passing to eternal life was celebrated with prayers of song, praise, witnessing, meditation and reflection. This was the culmination of a day of rejoicing at Mount Providence, Baltimore, motherhouse of the Oblate Sisters of Providence.

The chapel held a crowd greater than two hundred, gathered in joy and reverence for the saintly woman who inspired so many in her lifetime and afterwards. Father Sylvester Peterka, C.M., pastor of Immaculate Conception and St. Cecilia Catholic Churches spoke emphatically and enthusiastically, breaking open Scriptures of the following Fifth Sunday of Ordinary Time. There were problems in 1828 Baltimore and Mary Lange addressed them not just in word, but in deeds of true compassion and caring. God was searching: "Whom shall I send?" (Is.6). And Mary Lange answered in holy determination, "Send me". Then "Put out into deep water." (Lk.5). So children of color were changed; Baltimore was changed; the Catholic Church was changed; the world was

changed...the course of history was changed! Lives are being changed even today. Two women witnessed to the effect Mother Lange had on their families and personal health. Their faithful prayers asking for her intercession found a family saved from drowning in an auto accident; and a difficult and delicate brain operation undertaken successfully. Mother Lange herself was seen right before the patient succumbed to anesthesia. "Rest, my dear, you will be all right", were the reassuring, loving words heard by the patient. God still searches hearts today: "Whom shall I send?" Let us answer: "Send me!" Then put out into the deep waters with God's help to change the course of history, making this world a better place, God's place!

Teddy, Tony and Mel: Men also Emulate Mother Lange's Virtues

Emulation of the virtues of Mother Mary Lange is not restricted just to women. Interestingly enough, the whole idea of promoting the cause for canonization of Mother Mary Lange was initiated by a man—Theodore (Teddy) Wilson.

Sister Reginald Gerdes, OSP, Oblate historical researcher, writes “Teddy was diagnosed with serious heart problems and had to be hospitalized. He then invoked the intercession of Mother Mary Lange and...discovered that his symptoms became less severe. Upon leaving the hospital, Teddy intensified his devotion to Mother Lange and worked to introduce her cause for canonization.” (*The Catholic Review*, Dec. 14, ‘06)

Tony Williams, a policeman, trusted his children’s education to the Oblate Sisters. He grew to know and love Mother Lange and her daughters and was supportive of Oblate missions and ministries. Tony was always “on call” for anything the sisters needed: chauffeuring, security, assisting in so many ways requiring that special gift: brawn.

Melville (Mel) Pugh came to know and love Mother Lange and her daughters through his wife

Idell. Mel, a retired sociology professor at Morgan State U., supported everything his wife wanted to do for the sisters, and joined in efforts to promote the cause for canonization of Mother Lange. He made himself available to transport, help out, sell fruit cakes, and perform other tasks of the Mother Lange Guild. Some, like Teddy, Tony and Mel have gone on to Glory, but their names and deeds live after them in the thoughts, prayers and appreciation of the sisters.

Meanwhile God always provides. Men are called and respond to a woman whose spirituality knows no gender. Teddy, Tony and Mel are the tip of the iceberg. Others have stepped up to the plate and the cause for canonization progresses because of them: there are Lenwood, Ralph, Mike, Joe, George and Michael. There’re priests (especially Fr. Bowen, S.S.), deacons, Oblate Associates and others who have responded to the call of Providence to tell the world the transforming power in a soul that says “yes” to Grace. They give witness to the validity of a Providence Spirituality so exemplified by Mother Mary Lange that their own lives have been touched and influenced.
